

TMJH Reunification Drill

***Will take place some time
during 1st Quarter!***



A reunification occurs when a school closure or other emergency requires parents to retrieve their student from the school or other designated location. In the event of a *real* reunification, emergency information would be relayed to parents via automated phone call, email, the school and district websites, radio, television, etc.

Treasure Mountain Junior High will be conducting its annual state-mandated Emergency Reunification Drill sometime during 1st quarter. The purpose of this drill is not only to practice the school's response to an emergency, but to prepare parents and students for their role in an emergency, too. Details about the drill:

- The date and start time of the drill will not be announced ahead of time. The drill itself will last about 60 minutes.
- Parents will be notified via automated phone call, text, and/or email at the start of the drill.
- **Students will ONLY be released to parents or emergency contacts who are listed on the student's record *at the time of the reunification*. Photo ID will be required.**
- *The drill will take place at the Eccles Performing Arts Theater (@PCHS). Teachers will escort their class to designated areas at the Eccles. Student pick up directions for parents will be posted at the Eccles Theater during drill.*
- Students will remain with their teacher and class during the reunification. Teachers will take attendance and students will not be allowed to leave their assigned area unless a reunification runner comes to retrieve them.
- If a student is in a class at the high school, the parent or emergency contact will be directed to pick them up from the high school's main office.
- Students who are not picked up during the drill will continue the school day and will be released at the regular end-of-day dismissal bell.

We understand that this particular safety drill may be inconvenient, but we can all recognize the need for such drills in this day and age. Planning and practicing our safety procedures is very important for all school personnel, students, parents, and the community. Our primary concern is the safety and security of our students.
